As we reflect on the past year, we are honored to share with you not only recent accomplishments but those that have paved their way for us over the past 40 years. For four decades, The Guidance Center, has steadfastly operated with one focus: ensuring all who need our services receive quality care and treatment.

One of our main accomplishments this year was to update our Mission Statement to reflect our commitment to the community. Developed by staff, it is fitting that our new mission statement has an emphasis on connecting, supporting and providing guidance to people of all ages along life's path.

To reach more individuals, we renovated our West Washington Street facility to offer trainings and a meeting space for the community. Our first big event was the STEPS Drop-In Center: STEPS to a Healthy Relationship: A Musical Revue which showcased members and community talent. Through the support of the McKean County Department of Human Services, we are now able to offer Wellness Services in a space equipped to support physical health initiatives.

Additionally, we are now the host organization for the Northwest Regional Community Support Program of Pennsylvania meetings.

Through our Mental Health Awareness Training grant, we have educated over 200 community members in Mental Health First Aid, a national program to teach the skills to respond to the signs of mental illness and substance use.

In the past year, with the implementation of Same Day Access, our wait time for service initiation dropped from an average of 25 days to less than one day.

Our goal to increase our community presence continues. Staff have presented at several national and state conferences, and we have partnered with 3 universities and various local school districts to support internships as we recognize the need to assist with developing future leaders in the field.

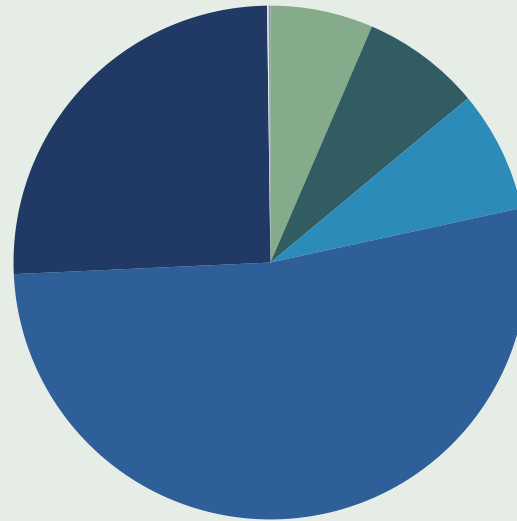
Areas Served

Today, TGC has expanded to 8 counties, employing over 160 individuals and providing 26 different programs.

All agency employees and its Board of Directors were treated to a catered lunch and were found enjoying yard Jenga, cornhole and socializing amongst each other. The celebration featured a photo booth, raffle baskets, a TGC trivia game and superlative "Office Awards." Additionally, a video was shown in which employees and clients shared their appreciation for the organization. A committee of TGC employees worked for months to plan and arrange the memorable event. Approximately 150 people were in attendance.

Enhancing Services

THE GUIDANCE CENTER PRESENTS IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

The Guidance Center was invited to present on the topic of Care Coordination at the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) Regional Meeting of CCBHC grantees in Washington, D.C. The National Council for Mental Wellbeing requested The Guidance Center's collaboration based on the agency's proven ability to provide a wide array of collaborative services and commitment to creating and maintaining strong, mutually beneficial partnerships with community partners across the service delivery area. Colleen M. Chahal, CCBHC Project Director at The Guidance Center, partnered with Jane King from the National Council to educate members from CCBHCs across Regions 3 and 4 about the importance of care coordination, the benefits of collaboration, and to offer suggestions for ways to strengthen current coordination efforts and pursue additional partnerships. "Being asked to present was definitely unexpected since it sometimes feels like smaller, rural agencies don't get as much attention but this just goes to show that it doesn't matter what size you are, if you're making a difference, people notice," remarked Ms. Chahal.

The Comprehensive Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) model is a federal initiative started in 2016 to reduce barriers to care and improve the quality of mental health and substance abuse treatment offered by community providers. As part of this initiative, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) funds community-based clinics through competitive grants. The Guidance Center has been a recipient of three CCBHC grants: the state-sponsored Demonstration Grant (2016-2020), the Expansion Grant (2020-2022) and the Improvement and Advancement Grant (2022-2026).

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING

We are proud to announce that our agency has been selected as a recipient of a Mental Health Awareness Training (MHAT) grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). This grant, awarded to only 22 organizations in the United States, is a testament to our unwavering commitment to promoting mental health awareness and fostering a community that is well-informed and supportive.

The SAMHSA Mental Health Awareness Training grant will empower us to expand its reach and impact in the community through comprehensive training programs. The grant will facilitate the development and implementation of innovative initiatives designed to raise awareness, reduce stigma, and enhance mental health literacy among residents of McKean County and the surrounding areas including a partnership with the Seneca Nation of Indians.

The Guidance Center has been a cornerstone in the provision of education, recovery oriented, crisis and behavioral health services in Bradford and surrounding communities. With the SAMHSA grant, the center aims to strengthen its role as a community resource for mental health education and support.

Committed to using the SAMHSA grant to make a lasting impact on mental health awareness in McKean County and surrounding communities, our agency began providing Mental Health First Aid training to businesses and organizations in the area in January of 2024. Additionally, through partnership with all school districts in McKean County, Mental Health First Aid for Youth will be available. By providing education and resources, the center aims to empower individuals to seek help and create a more compassionate and supportive community.



SINGLE-SESSION CONSULTATION

In May 2024, The Guidance Center launched Single-Session Consultation (SSC) which is an evidence-based, flexible program that directly addresses the need to support people when they seek care, rather than wait weeks to months to begin services.

Grounding in solution-focused brief therapy, the SSC is a provider-delivered program, designed for delivery in a single 30 to 60 minute session, that can support people precisely when they reach out for mental health treatment - boosting their motivation for change and buffering against symptom declines while people wait for longer-term care.

Within just one SSC meeting, clinical staff can help the individual identify the tools and capabilities they already possess to solve a problem and take steps towards a future in which that problem is less influential.

SSC has prevented and reduced mental health problems in teens and adults waiting for longer-term treatment while strengthening their sense of hope and boosting motivation for change.



TRAUMA INFORMED CARE RE-CERTIFICATION

Representatives from the Behavioral Health Alliance of Rural Pennsylvania (BHARP) came to reevaluate and designate the agency, once again, as a North Central Trauma-Informed Care Center for behavioral health services.

TGC received a PERFECT score and are beyond grateful for the community we serve!

FAMILY GRADUATES FROM NURTURING PARENTING PROGRAM

Virginia, a dedicated single mother of Logan and Scarlett, has been actively involved in The Guidance Center's programs over the years. She began her journey with Project RAPPORT and later participated in Parents as Teachers. Recognizing the need for ongoing support, Virginia proactively sought out additional resources from The Guidance Center and enrolled in the Nurturing Parenting Program.

Virginia's relationship with her children was once strained due to personal challenges. She faced a difficult period when she lost custody and struggled with substance use. However, Virginia was able to overcome these obstacles and regain custody of her children. Determined to rebuild their bond and heal from the past, she enrolled in the Nurturing Parenting Program. As she and her children navigated the program together, they received valuable support and guidance on their journey of reconnection and recovery.

One of the lessons Virginia learned while enrolled in Nurturing Parenting Program was the importance of self-care. She realized that prioritizing her own well-being is essential for effectively caring for her children. While there are days when she faces challenges, Virginia's commitment to self-care has helped her overcome obstacles and maintain her mental health. She believes that the Nurturing Parenting Program can benefit parents from all backgrounds by building their confidence, providing essential tools, and supporting their overall well-being. She is deeply grateful for the support and services her family has received from The Guidance Center.

Through the Nurturing Parenting Program, Virginia has gained self-confidence, valuable resources, and the essential tools to navigate her role as a parent. The program has helped her set realistic expectations for her children, manage their mental health challenges, and create a supportive environment for her family. As a result of her participation, Virginia has successfully addressed her family's needs and is proud to have graduated from the program in July 2024.

CLIENT SUCCESS: TOGETHER AS A TEAM

In 2023, Leslie was hospitalized in a psychiatric treatment facility. At that time, she was struggling in many areas of her life, and it was identified she needed more support. At discharge she started receiving additional supportive services including Peer Support, Psychiatric Rehabilitation, Blended Case Management, and Psychiatric Services. Each program worked collaboratively as a team to support Leslie in achieving her personal and professional goals.

Since leaving the hospital and working extensively with her treatment team, Leslie reports she has been thriving. She has developed increased self-confidence, which has helped her recognize healthy relationships. Leslie continues to set new goals and work towards achieving them. One of her primary goals was to secure employment. She is proud to report that since building these new skills, she has been able to obtain a job.

Leslie expressed that her service providers have done an excellent job of helping her reach her goals while allowing her to progress at her own pace. Leslie reports that The Guidance Center has been exceptionally supportive in understanding her individual circumstances and unique needs, as evidenced by valuing her input and actively involving her in the treatment planning process. As a result of her progress, the frequency of her services has been reduced.

Leslie would like to express her sincere gratitude to her treatment team. She reports having a wonderful team supporting her and feels she has built a strong connection with her team. She is incredibly grateful for this dedicated team who have played a crucial role in her journey.



FOCUS ROOM CONTINUES TO BENEFIT STUDENTS

The Focus Room, a restorative program designed to address the needs of students who are falling behind, is providing a supportive and structured environment for students to refocus on their education for a second year in a row at the Bradford Area High School. In the 2023-2024 academic year, there were 3,275 visits to the Focus Room.

Under the guidance of the Focus Room Manager, Cathy Gabel, and Lead Worker, Nicole Drabert, the Focus Room offers a variety of services, including:

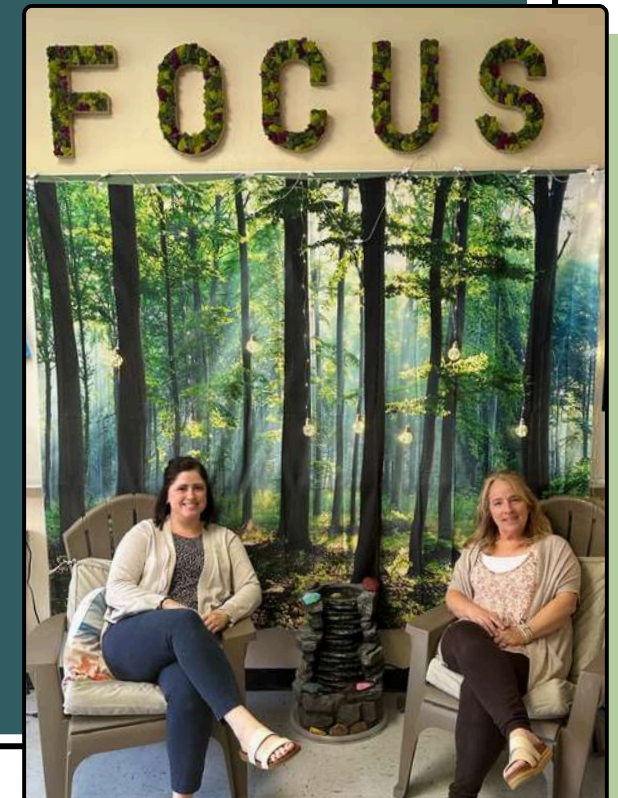
- Restorative processes: For students who are not meeting school expectations.
- Recovery and return to learning: Helping students get back on track academically.
- Structure and support: Providing a safe and supportive space for students.
- Refocusing for homework or social time: Helping students stay focused and productive.

The program is an integral part of the school's positive behavior support system and aims to address a range of issues that can impact student success, such as academic struggles, behavioral challenges, and social difficulties.

Local teachers are already seeing positive results from the Focus Room. One teacher noted, "Gives students who are struggling a chance to become regulated while freeing the teacher to continue teaching the class without disruptions. Calmer learning environment, improved completion of assignments."

Another teacher added, "I think the FOCUS room in the building is a great resource, particularly for students who suffer with anxiety, depression, a rough home, life, etc."

As the program continues to evolve, teachers and administrators are hopeful that the Focus Room will continue to be a valuable resource for students in need. "I am hopeful the FOCUS room will continue to be a resource that is available to our students," said one teacher.

CLIENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE

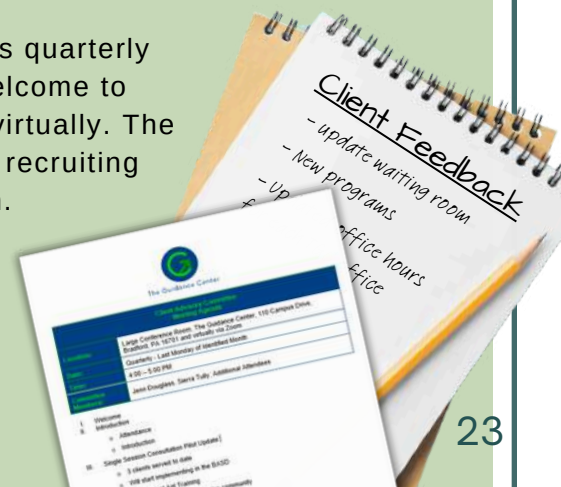

TGC ATTENDS NATIONAL NIGHT OUT



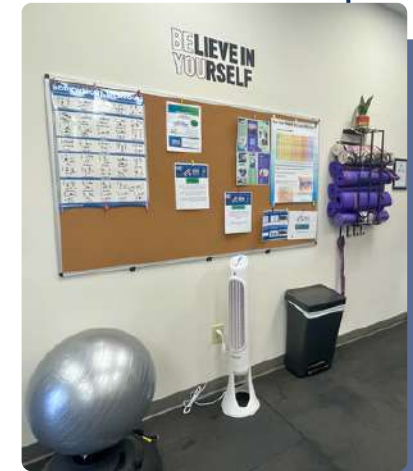

UPDATES TO THE ST. MARYS OFFICE

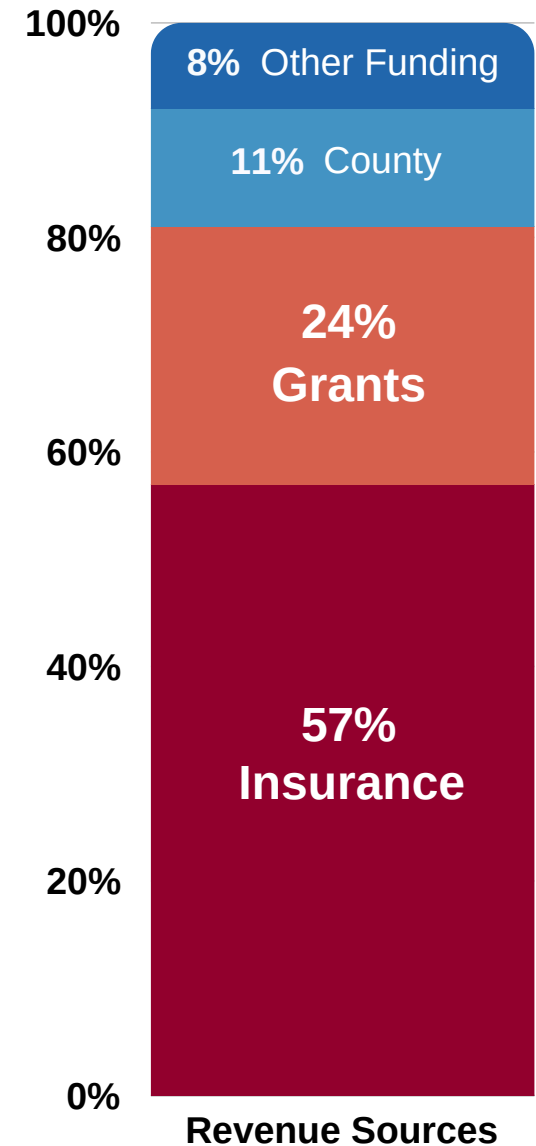
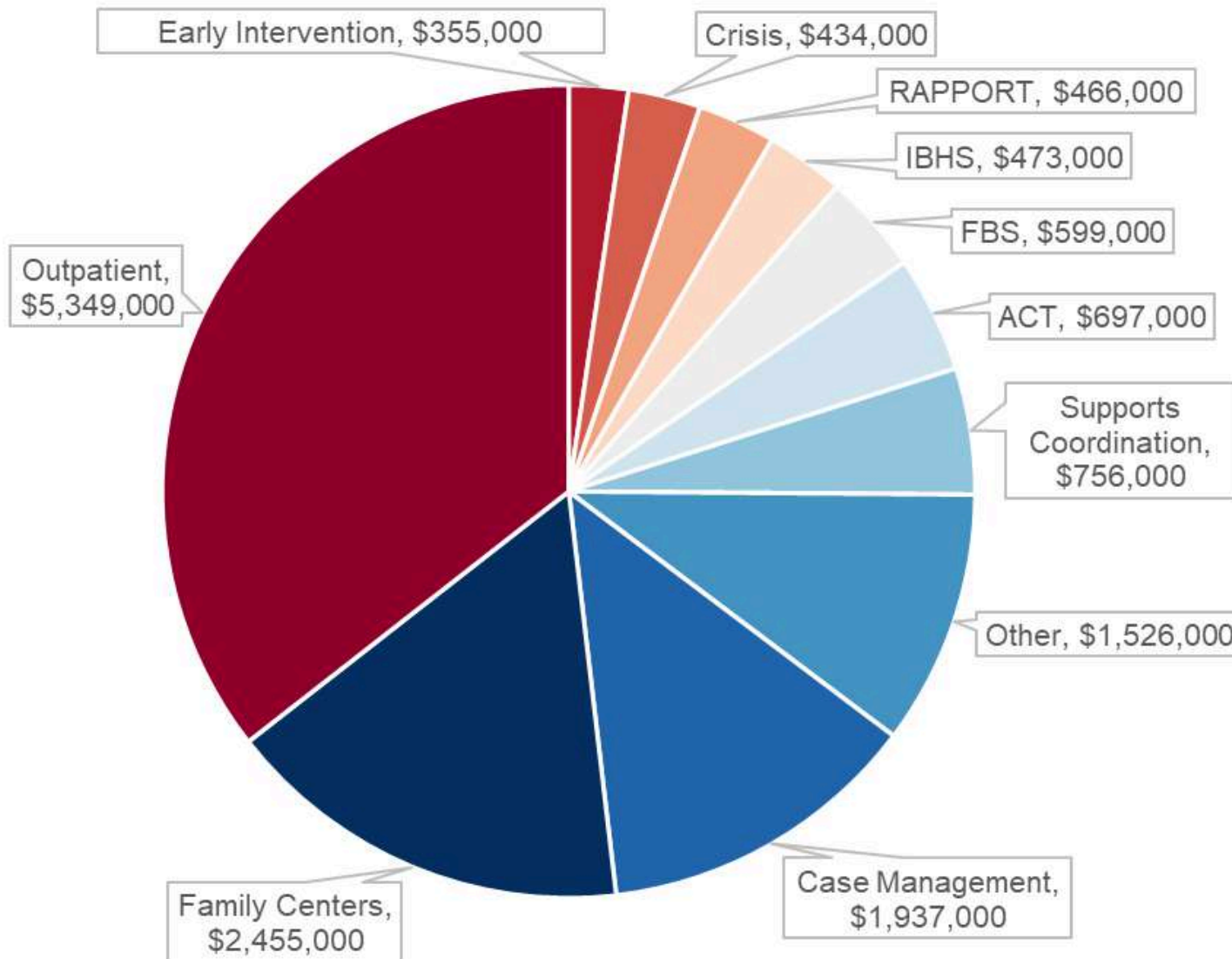
